## Quarterly Report to the Crawford District Advisory Council

### NALOXONE DISTRIBUTED TO BUCYRUS POLICE DEPT.

The Ohio Mental Health & Addiction Services (OhioMHAS) provided funds to every county health department to distribute naloxone and Project DAWN kits (Death Avoidance With Naloxone) to local law enforcement, emergency personnel, and first responders. Crawford County Public Health was allocated \$1,800 to fill requests from those agencies. The funding is available through June 30, 2016.

In March 2015, Bucyrus Police Department requested 6 Project DAWN kits & 14 refills. There are still supplies left if any other first responders would like to carry Naloxone as they respond to calls regarding drug overdose.



### ZIKA VIRUS

Although not a new virus, 2015 marked the first widespread transmission of the Zika virus in the Americas. For the first time, the virus seems to be connected to

a steep increase in birth defects, including microcephaly (abnormal smallness of the head). Coinciding with the Zika virus has been a rise in the number of cases of Guillain-Barré syndrome (a disorder in which the body's immune system attacks part of the peripheral nervous system). The most common symptoms of Zika virus are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). People usually don't get sick enough to go to the hospital, and they very rarely die of Zika. Zika virus is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected *Aedes aegypti* mosquito found in the tropics and in the southern United States. However, it has also been reported in non-travelers after their sexual partners returned from an affected area and developed symptoms. In Ohio, we do not have the *Aedes aegypti* mosquito, but we do have a related mosquito, the Asian tiger mosquito (*Aedes albopictus*) that may potentially transmit Zika virus.

The best way to avoid Zika virus infection and other mosquito-borne diseases is to prevent mosquito bites:

- When outdoors, wear [Environmental Protection Agency \(EPA\) registered insect repellents](#). All EPA

registered insect repellents have been evaluated for effectiveness. Always follow the product label instructions.

- Unlike many mosquitoes, the Asian tiger mosquitoes are most active during the day and are most common in shade conditions. Be sure to use insect repellent and wear long sleeves and pants where these mosquitoes are active.
- Make sure you have good screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out.
- Yellow fever mosquitoes and Asian tiger mosquitoes are both container breeding mosquitoes. They do not breed in ponds, puddles or marshes. Remove their breeding sites by emptying standing water from flower pots, buckets and barrels. Change the water in pet dishes, and replace the water in bird baths weekly. Drill holes in tire swings so water drains out. Keep children's wading pools empty and on their sides when they aren't being used.

## FOOD SAFETY AWARD WINNERS

The food licensing year runs from March 1 – February 28. The 2015 licensing year ended this quarter and we are pleased to see seventeen (17) facilities qualify for a food safety award. This years winners are: Buckeye Central Schools, Bucyrus Elementary & High Schools, Crestline Child Care, Crestline High School, The Daily Scoop (Bucyrus), Heartland Care Center (Bucyrus), Katering Kountry Style (Bucyrus), Kentucky Fried Chicken (Galion/Polk Township), Little Athens (Bucyrus), Maplecrest Assisted Living (Bucyrus), Taco Bell (Bucyrus), Walmart, Wynford Elementary and High Schools and Wagon Wheel Campground (Shelby/Auburn Township).

The criteria to receive a food safety award includes: 0 critical violations for the entire licensing year, 3 or fewer non-critical violations, submission of proof of Food Safety Training and submission of a sick policy to ensure employees that are ill are not preparing food.

## ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH DIVISION

We continue to complete the final requirements for the procurement of the Ohio EPA grant monies to repair and/or replace failing household sewage treatment systems in Oceola (Tod Township). We are still projected to receive \$132,000 for the Oceola project and all contracts should be in place soon.

In March we attended a regional meeting concerning the updates that have been made to the Ohio Dept. of Health Campground Rules and Regulations. Several significant changes have been made and will be enforced by our department.

The Community Health Assessment Report will be presented to the public on May 16, 2016 from 10:00am – 12:00pm (noon) at Grace



Point Church, 683 Portland Way North, Galion, OH 44833. This presentation will be based on the data collected from Crawford County youth and adults. The local data about Crawford County residents is reported along with health information from national, state and local data sources. The health status assessment is invaluable because it serves as a guide for strategic planning and decision-making. It can help our community identify new health concerns, measure the impact of current community efforts, and guide the use of local resources. The presentation is open to the public and we encourage all residents of Crawford County to attend.

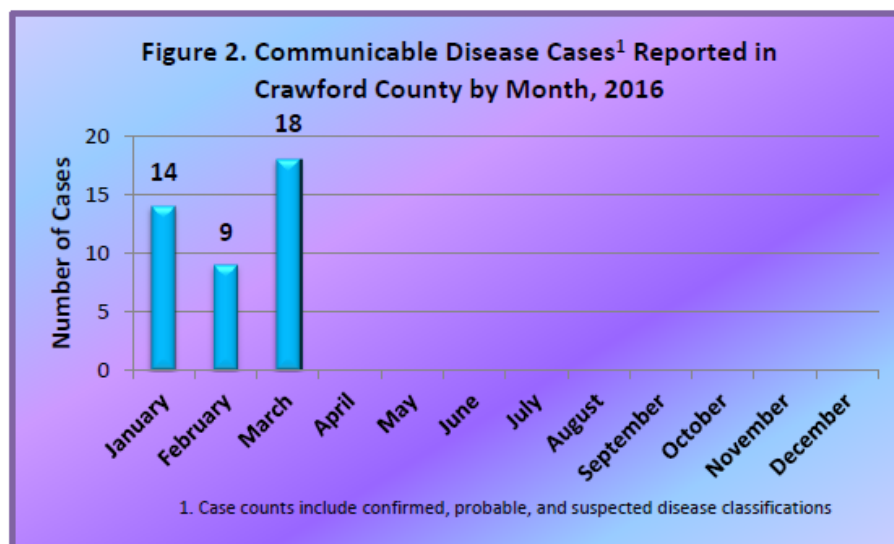


Figure 2. displays the number of reportable disease cases occurring in Crawford County this year.



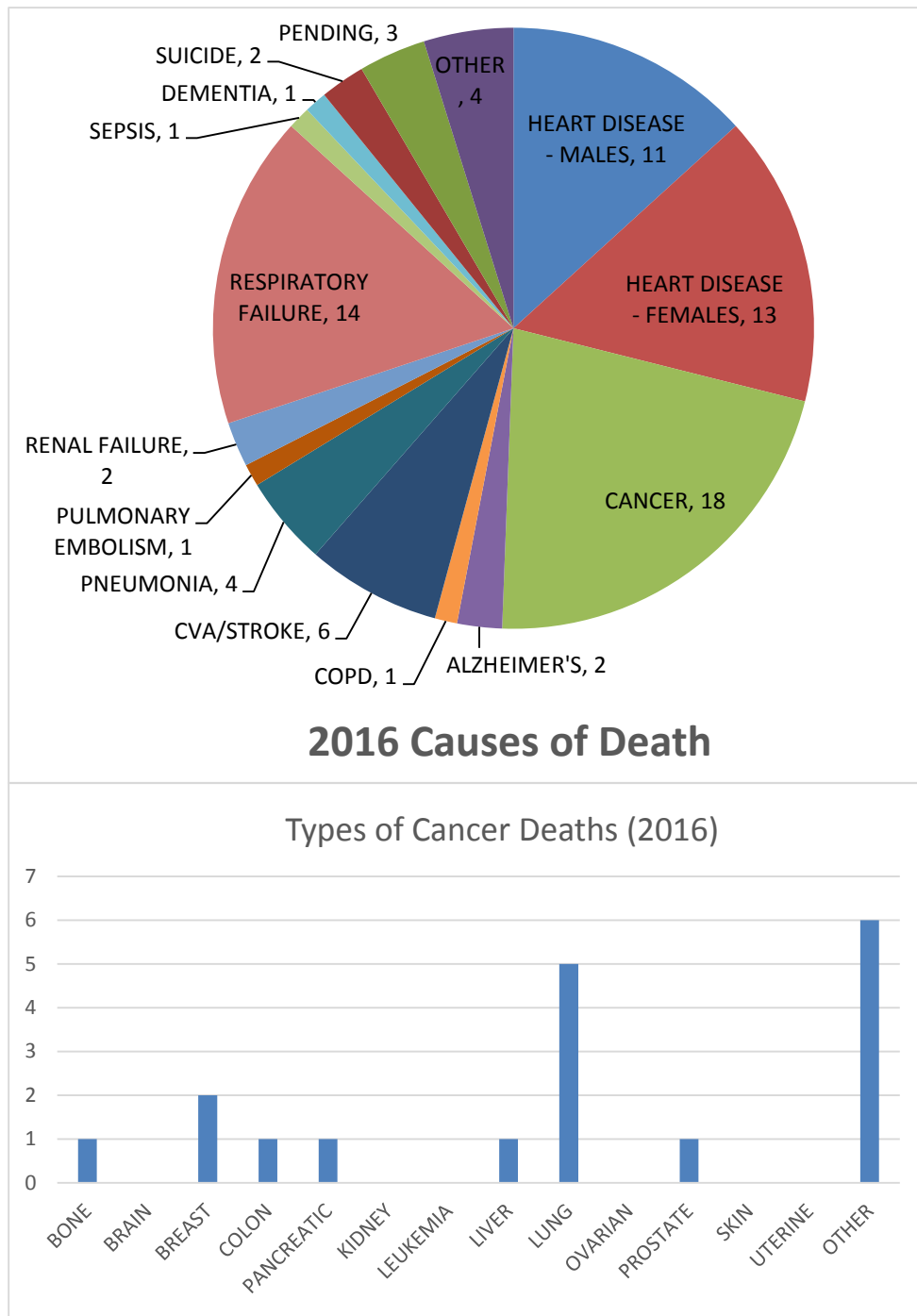
**HELP ME GROW HIGHLIGHTS**

- This quarter in Help Me Grow we continued our outreach efforts by distributing OH BABY! Kits to area OB/GYN's and birthing hospitals. The kits are provided by the Ohio Department of Health and includes information on nutrition, breastfeeding, safe sleep, becoming new parents, and has a Fever Scan strip, Read to Your Bunny book, growth chart and emergency number magnet.
- Despite ever tightening restrictions on who is eligible for our programs, we continue to meet state targets. Nonetheless, we still struggle at times with maintaining some families in our programs due to parental drug involvement. We have outreached to local resources such as ADAMH Board and Maryhaven to educate ourselves about addiction and the recovery process to better serve these families.
- Our staff is currently being trained in the "Happiest Baby" Education Program. It is a child abuse and prevention program designed to teach families how to better cope with their newborn through age 5 sleep challenges.
- In February, our Early Intervention Program formally transitioned from Ohio Department of Health to Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities. With the change, many ODH staff went to DODD. Our services at the local level will remain the same through at least July 1, 2017.
- Our Healthy Families Program is busy preparing for accreditation and a site visit planned for mid- August. Danelle Barney, our county's Healthy Families Grant Manager, is busy writing county specific policies for the 12 Healthy Families America Benchmarks relating to maternal and child health.
- This quarter in HMG we made 470 home visits serving a total of 165 children in our three programs: Home Visiting (Parent Education for first time parents); Healthy Families (Parent Education for second time parents and beyond); and Early Intervention (family centered services for children with a developmental delay or medical condition likely to result in a delay).
- Help Me Grow Staff (comprised of 7 individuals) made a total of 511 home visits.

## NURSING DIVISION - 1<sup>ST</sup> QUARTER HIGHLIGHTS

### Immunization Program

- A total of 247 clients were seen and 568 vaccines were given this quarter

### Children with Medical Handicaps

- We currently have a total of 104 children we assist with this program
- \$3,370 billed and have received \$2,140

### Communicable Disease

- The Nursing Department investigated 77 communicable diseases the first quarter of the year: 36 Hepatitis C, 3 Hepatitis B, 23 Chlamydia and 15 miscellaneous diseases.
- Nurses go to Maryhaven every 6 weeks for communicable disease education and testing

### Lead Program

- 6 Lead Screenings performed
- 4 clients receiving Lead Case Management

### STD/HIV Program

- There were 19 clients tested for HIV & 21 clients tested for Chlamydia/Gonorrhea at the Health Department. Of the clients tested for STD's, 3 received antibiotic treatment.

### School Nursing

- We provided 1,359 nursing hours in the schools and billed \$44,877.00
- We provide services for five of our county's school districts: Buckeye Central, Bucyrus, Colonel Crawford, Crestline & Wynford. (We also fill in for the nurse at Fairway/Waycraft, as needed.)

### Jail Nursing

- Nurses worked 407 hours at the Crawford County Jail and billed \$14,366.25
- Statistics: 331 inmates booked in, 210 physicals completed, 339 sick inmates seen, and 50 treated for drug and/or alcohol withdrawal

### Council on Aging

- 76 clients seen
- Nurse worked 71 hours and billed \$2,586.64

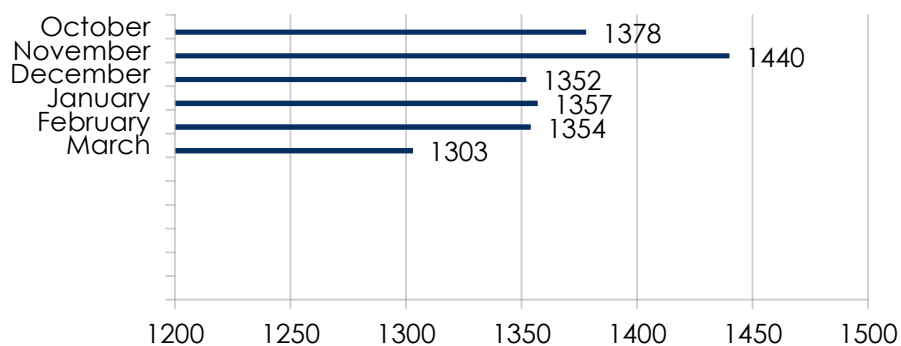

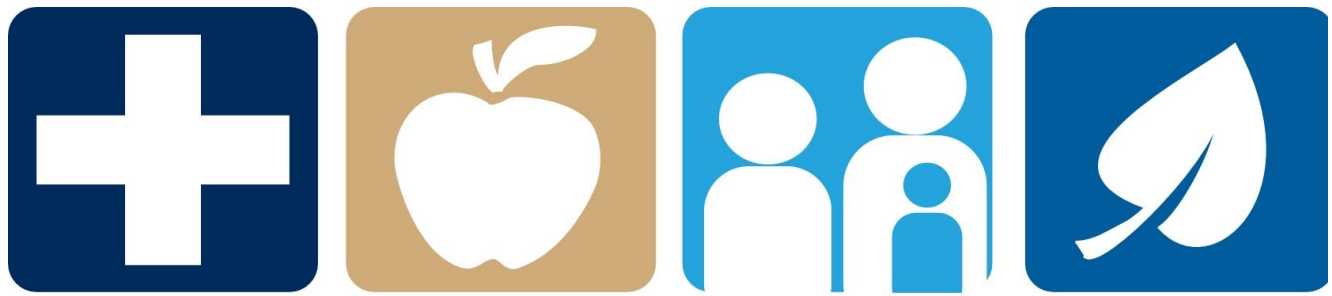
