NALOXONE (NARCAN) DISTRIBUTION

BOARD OF HEALTH ATTENDANCE & ACTIONS (JANUARY – JUNE, 2018)

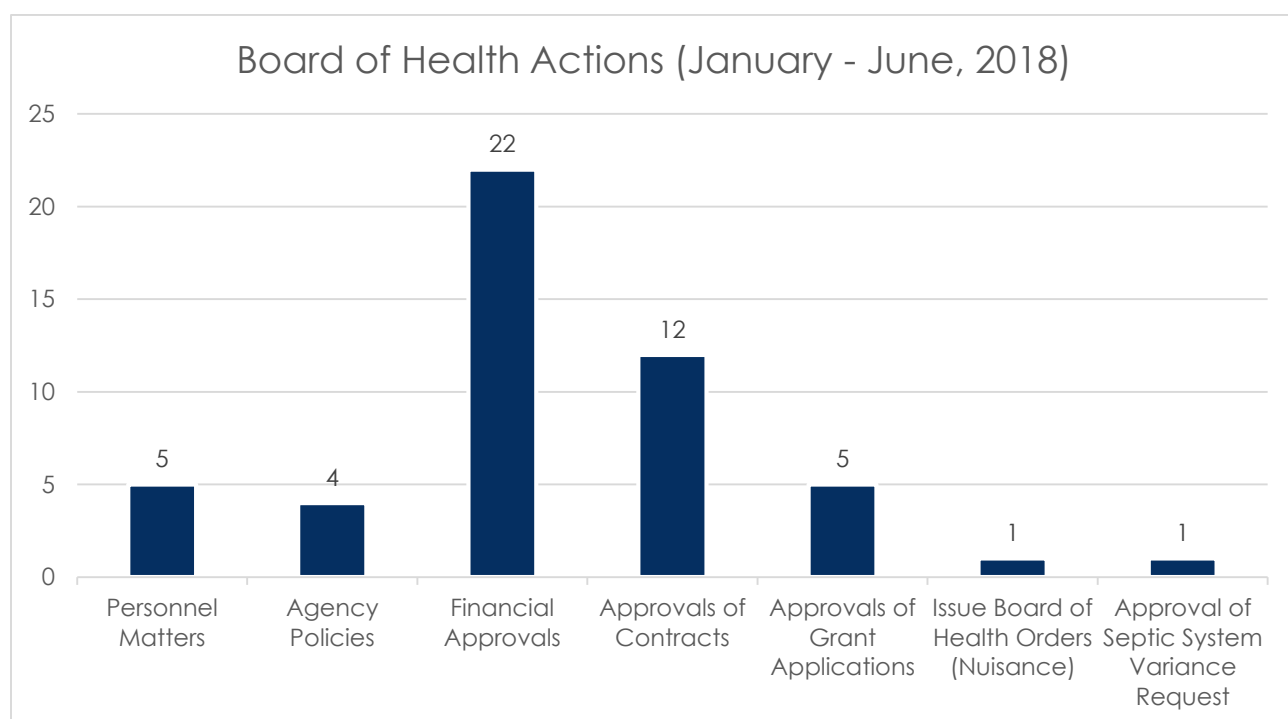

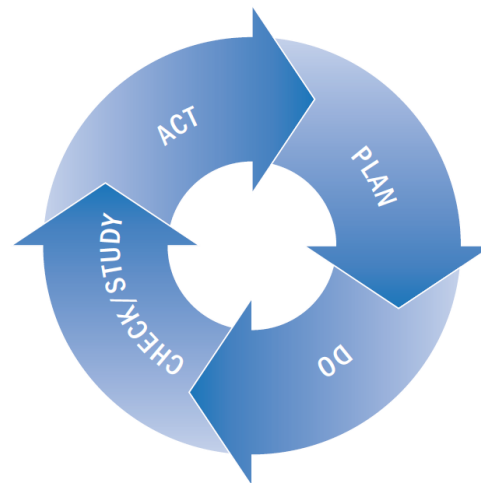


All Staff Performance Management Training

- For the month of June, our first all staff training on performance management took the place of the monthly Accreditation Staff Meeting. Anne Goon, MS, RD, LD, a Public Health Consultant for OSU's Center for Public Health Practice, shared a beginner's guide-style training session on quality improvement and performance management concepts and frameworks. In addition, Anne provided a second session for Directors and CCPH's Performance Management Writing Team that consisted of examples of how a health department might apply performance measurements.

Quality Improvement

- Thanks to the assistance provided by OSU Center for Public Health Practice, we were able to wrap up the writing of our Quality Improvement Plan by the end of June. The completion of our Quality Improvement Plan will provide a continuing process of improvement that shows what is actually happening to ensure customer satisfaction. The plan also provides written credibility and is a visible sign of management support and commitment to quality throughout the organization.

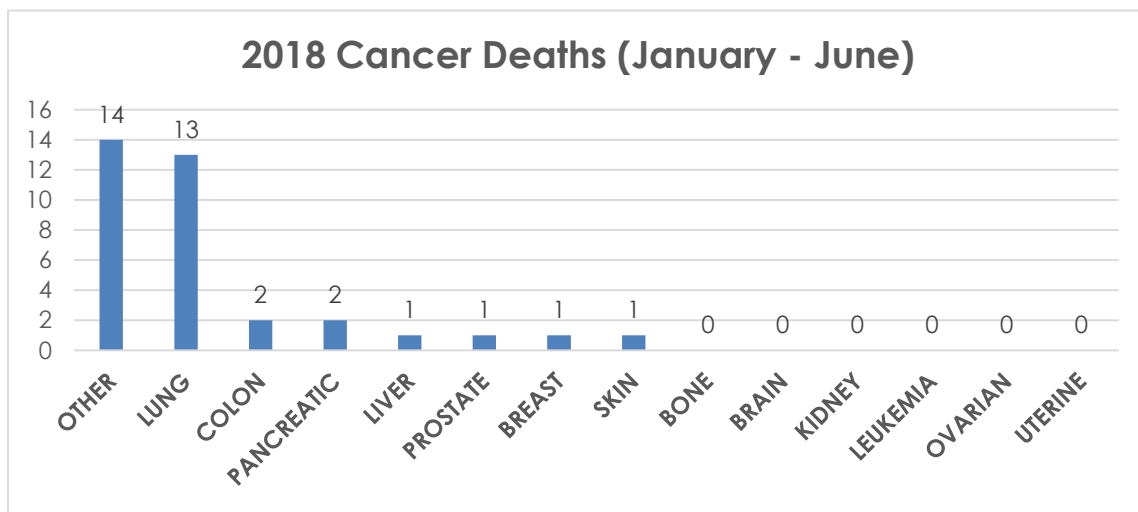
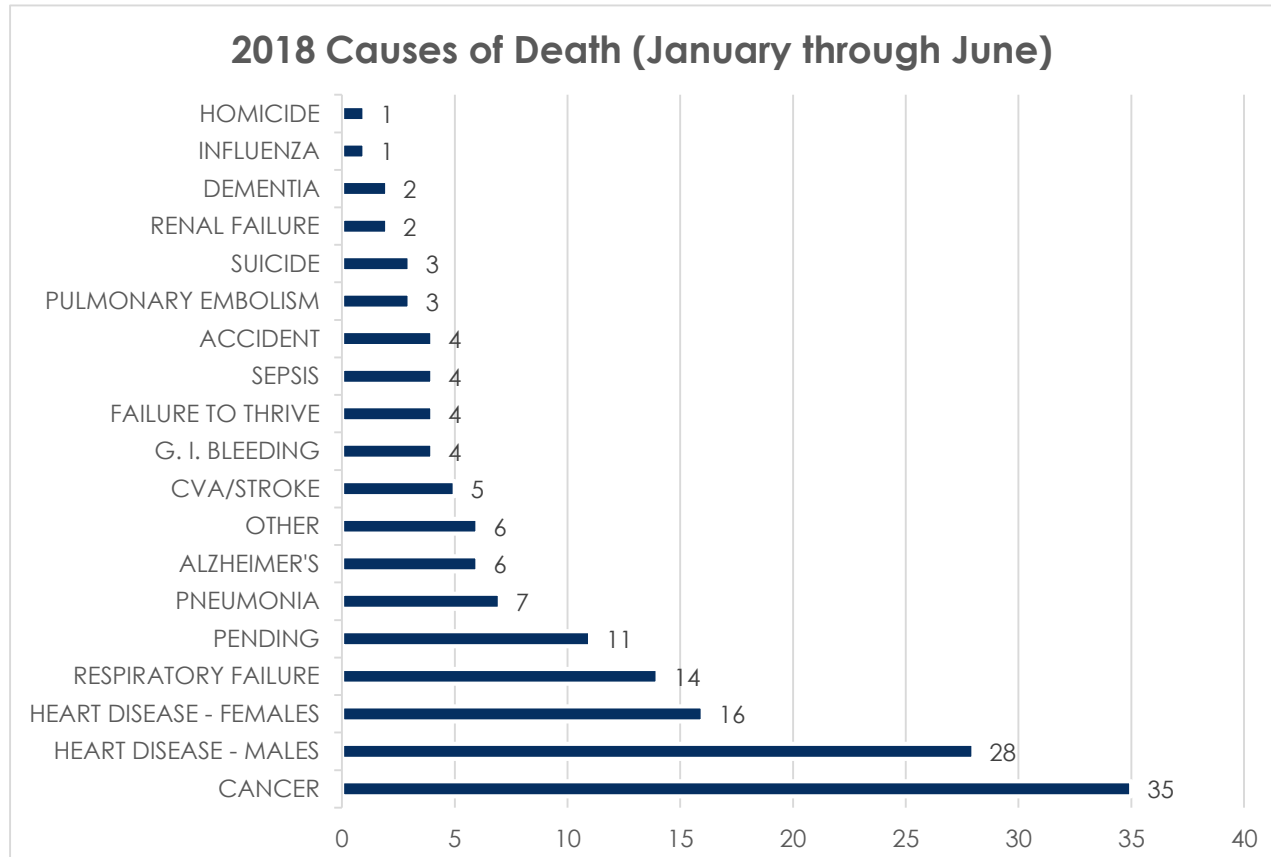


This figure illustrates the Plan-Do-Study-Act cycle that CCPH will utilize for their Quality Improvement Process.

NURSING DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

Immunization Program

- A total of 387 clients were seen and 1,024 vaccines were given in the 1st six months of 2018.

Communicable Disease Investigation

- The Nursing Department investigated the following number of communicable disease cases during the 1st half of the year: 73 Hepatitis C, 20 Hepatitis B, 45 Chlamydia, 28 Influenza, and 28 miscellaneous diseases.
- From January through June we have completed 11 tests for Hepatitis C, 17 test for HIV, 35 for Chlamydia, 35 for Gonorrhea, and have provided 4 pregnancy tests.

CMH (Children with Medical Handicaps)

The Children with Medical Handicaps Program (CMH) is a health care program that links families to a network of quality providers and helps families obtain payment for the services their children need. We currently have 105 children we assist with this program.

Jail Nursing

Nurses worked 719.75 hours at the Crawford County Justice Center from January – June with 555 inmates booked in, 341 physicals completed, 600 sick inmates seen, and 76 inmates seen for drug and alcohol withdrawals.

School Nursing

We are pleased to be able to continue providing services for six schools in Crawford County with contracts in place for the 2018-2019 school year: Buckeye Central, Bucyrus, Colonel Crawford, Crestline, Crestline St. Joe's, and Wynford. Additionally, we also fill in at Fairway/Waycraft when needed.

National Nurses Week

National Nurses Week begins each year on May 6th and ends on May 12th, Florence Nightingales's birthday. We are fortunate to have some pretty amazing nurses working at CCPH covering a wide-variety of services.

In the picture to the right, starting at the top and working left to right, thank you to Amy, Rae, Lisa, Erin (the full-time nurses at the office), Kim, Beth, Whitney, Kara, Crystal (part-time nurses assigned to the schools), as well as Becky, Cassie, & Erica (former nurses once assigned to a school but only working occasionally to fill-in since they needed to leave us to care for their families - but love the job so much they keep coming back!).



ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH DIVISION REPORT:

In our food program we received plans for two new mobile food operations, the installation of a new food operation and the remodel of two existing facilities.

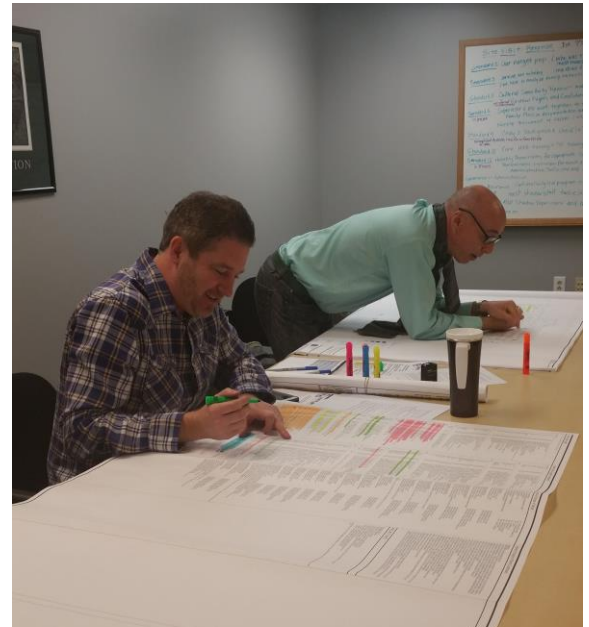
NEW MOBILE OPERATIONS: Smokie's Hog, Sandwiches, & Fries and Mark's Homemade Ice Cream.

NEW FOOD OPERATION: Fit, Fab, Fun, LLC

REMODELED/REBUILDING OPERATIONS: Kroger, Wendy's

With the exception of Smokie's Hog, Sandwiches, & Fries located in Crestline Village, the remaining operations are all in Bucyrus City. All plan reviews progressed smoothly and we are anxiously awaiting the opening and reopening of these facilities.

The 2017 grant cycle for the OEPA sewage grant continues with 14 properties in process and several more in the evaluation stage. With the sewage season becoming more active, we are hoping to repair or replace several more systems with the 2017 grant monies. The total allotment for 2017 was \$300,000.00 and we anticipate spending the entire amount on repair and replacement of failing systems throughout the county. If you are aware of any residents in the townships that are in need of replacing their sewage systems and that might benefit from our grant, please have them contact our grant administrator, Cindy Brookes at 419-332-2078.

Our department entered a contract to conduct inspections for Crawford County for the Department of Commerce. The actual enforcement of correction of violations noted by our department will be with Department of Commerce.



At the June 2018 Board of Health meeting, this property was deemed as having conditions of a public health nuisance and was referred to the county prosecutor for failure to comply with Board of Health orders.

Hosting clinics, like the one we will have at the fairgrounds on October 16th, helps us practice dealing with large volumes of people, controlling the flow of services, and strengthens our ability to respond.

HELP ME GROW (HMG) DIVISION



Help Me Grow begins each spring by co-sponsoring the annual Dream Child conference. Over 100 people attended the all-day training featuring presentations on the role social media is placing on self-image and relational skills, school violence and bullying as well as the ethical issues of technology and media in the workplace.

As part of CCPH's Community Health Improvement Plan, our HMG Home Visitors met quarterly with OB staff at AVITA Galion Hospital to develop strategies to improve prenatal outcomes for our community. An initiative that sprang from meeting was providing TREAT Totes for all moms giving birth at AVITA. The tote along with one of the books were funded by UNITED WAY. CRAWFORD READS 20 provided a touch and feel board book.



Pictured to the right are various other items and information in the tote. We want to spread the message that a parent is a child's first and most important teacher and HMG and other child serving agencies are here to support them.

Our program has always felt the support of our community. Each quarter we try to highlight donations provided to our program. Gloria Nelson and Janice Auck from the Chatfield Evangelical Church have been hard at work sewing an enormous amount of items for us. The clothing, blankets, car seat covers and bibs have brought big smiles from our toddlers and babies too. Their next project is sewing infant sleep sacks to help reduce the risk of SIDS or sudden infant death syndrome. Home Visitor Christy Holman has been faithful in picking up the items and offering ideas to sew.



Paw Patrol's Marshall was a huge hit for our Family Connection Meeting. Christy's mom, Becky Barr, former preschool teacher and librarian, read to the children. Becky picked up the pizza too! Deb and Jim Pigman donated their time and supplies once again helping our HMG families plant flower pots at one of our other events. We would like to extend a huge thank you to these individuals and the many who offer ongoing donations!!

As a partner in CRAWFORD READS 20, a book distribution program promoting reading 20 minutes a day to your infant through third grade, we were delighted in being chosen as the recipient of this year's Bucyrus Rotary Auctionfest. Over \$21,000 was donated for the purchase of books. CR20 provides books at HMG events and other gatherings such as First Fridays, Movie Nights, summer lunch programs throughout the county, safety towns and school open houses and literacy events.

Staff were hard at work this quarter as we transitioned to a more rigorous program model. Supervisor, Andrea Kirgis, and the rest of our staff attended multiple trainings and have worked diligently to meet model fidelity standards. This entailed updating and analyzing multiple spreadsheets and providing written narratives about our policy changes. Staff also came in extra early this quarter as the Ohio Department of Health designed an updated data maintenance system. HMG agencies across the state were all trying to enter data into the former system before the switch. With so much activity on the site, it was down frequently. Our staff met the deadline and the new system will be a much overdue improvement.



CRAWFORD READS 20 (one of the many community initiatives CCPH staff are involved with) was honored to be the recipient of funds from the Bucyrus Rotary Auctionfest. Over \$21,000 was raised to be used for purchasing books.

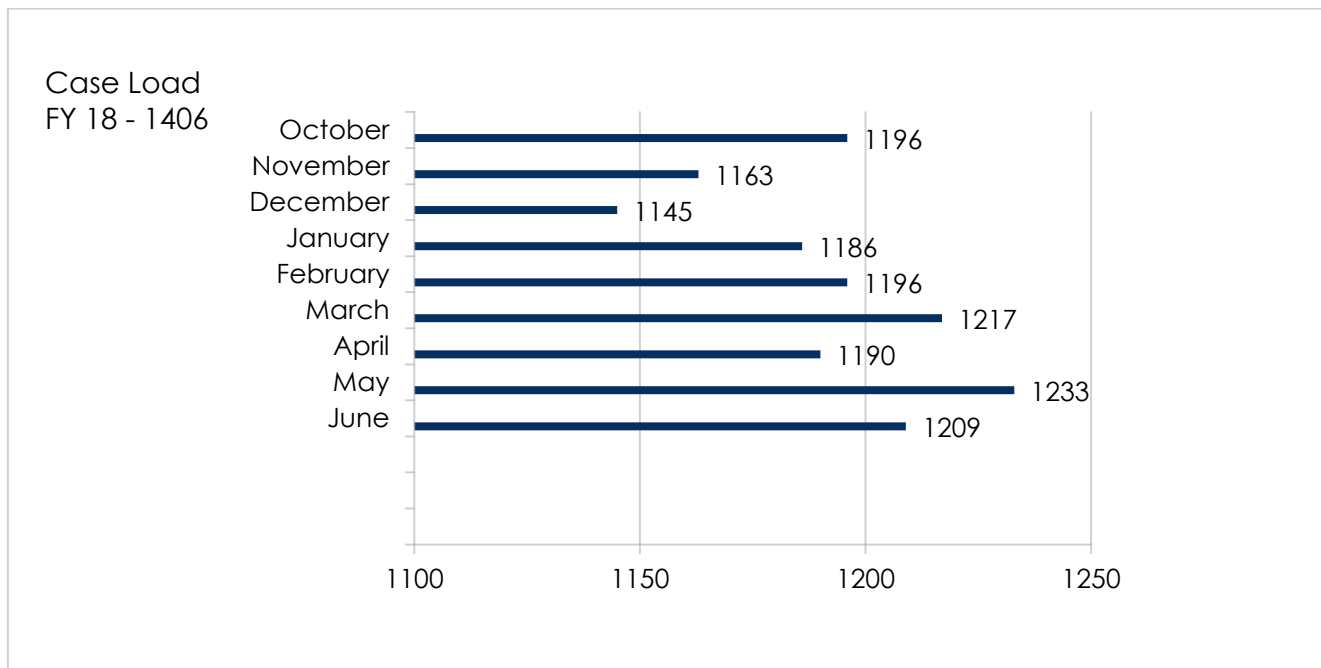
- At the end of this Quarter, we have spent approximately 70% of the Grant.
- We have attended Crawford Community Council, Crawford Childhood Initiative, Family and Children First, Prenatal Outcomes, Dream Child Conference, Monthly Board meetings, Directors Meetings, SMILE group meetings (Supporting Mother Infant Lactation Education), Prenatal Outcomes, State Directors Meeting Webinar, Community Health Assessment meeting, CQI for Public Health , The Fundamentals, WIC Breastfeeding and curriculum, Deanna and Mary attended a state sponsored seminar; Milk Mob, and Monica, Kathy, Jill and Holly all took a CPR class from the Health Department.
- What is going on at WIC; we continue to educate participants on Nutrition and Breastfeeding, along with being a referral program to the many different agencies in the community. We continue to work with the Health Department to make sure our participants are up to date on all of the immunizations that they need and lead screenings. We work with Help Me Grow by referring many of our new pregnant moms to their program for the guidance they may need as a new parent, or a parent of many, or referrals to agencies that may help them in their journey as a parent.
- We submitted our FY19 Solicitation on May 17, 2018.

Who is Eligible for WIC?

Who is eligible: Women who are pregnant, breastfeeding or have a baby less than 6 months old, and infants and children up to age 5. **To qualify for services you must:** live in Ohio, meet WIC income guidelines, have certain nutritional or health risks.

A PEEK AT THE PAST

Each municipality was required to form a Board of Health in 1893, meaning that nearly 2,150 health departments existed in Ohio. It wasn't until the statewide smallpox epidemic in 1917, followed by the nationwide influenza epidemic of 1918, that Ohio realized a more comprehensive and formalized approach to public health was necessary.

In 1919, the Hughes-Griswold Act passed and established that municipalities with at least a population of 5,000 could establish a city health district and that townships and villages could consolidate to form general health districts. Here is a copy of the minutes from that very first Crawford County District Advisory Council meeting held August 8, 1919 that created the county-wide health department.

Bucyrus O. August 8th 1919

The Advisory Board of the Crawford County Board of Health met in the Court Room at Bucyrus, Ohio. Wednesday, Aug. 8th 1919. at 2 o'clock P.M.

The Board then proceeded to organize by electing Mr. M. Ott Mayor of Bucyrus, President of the Board, & Geo. E. Ryan Chairman Twp. Trustee Bucyrus Twp. Clerk for a term of one year from the 1st Monday of February 1920.

The Board then proceeded to appoint a Board of Health for the County. Moved by Elmer Hoover that W. G. Carlisle M.D. of Bucyrus be elected Member of the Board, seconded by Babst carried - Moved by Babst that J. A. Agnew, M.D. of Pleasantine be elected, second by Hoover, carried - Moved by Babst that Frank Pigman be elected to the Board, second by Biehl - carried - Moved by J. L. Miller that Abe Schaefer of Lykens Twp. be elected to the Board - second by W. S. Kiese - carried - Moved by Biehl that C. A. Hildebrand of New Washington be elected a member, second by Commonwealth. carried.

Lots were then drawn to determine the term of office of each member and resulted as follows.
