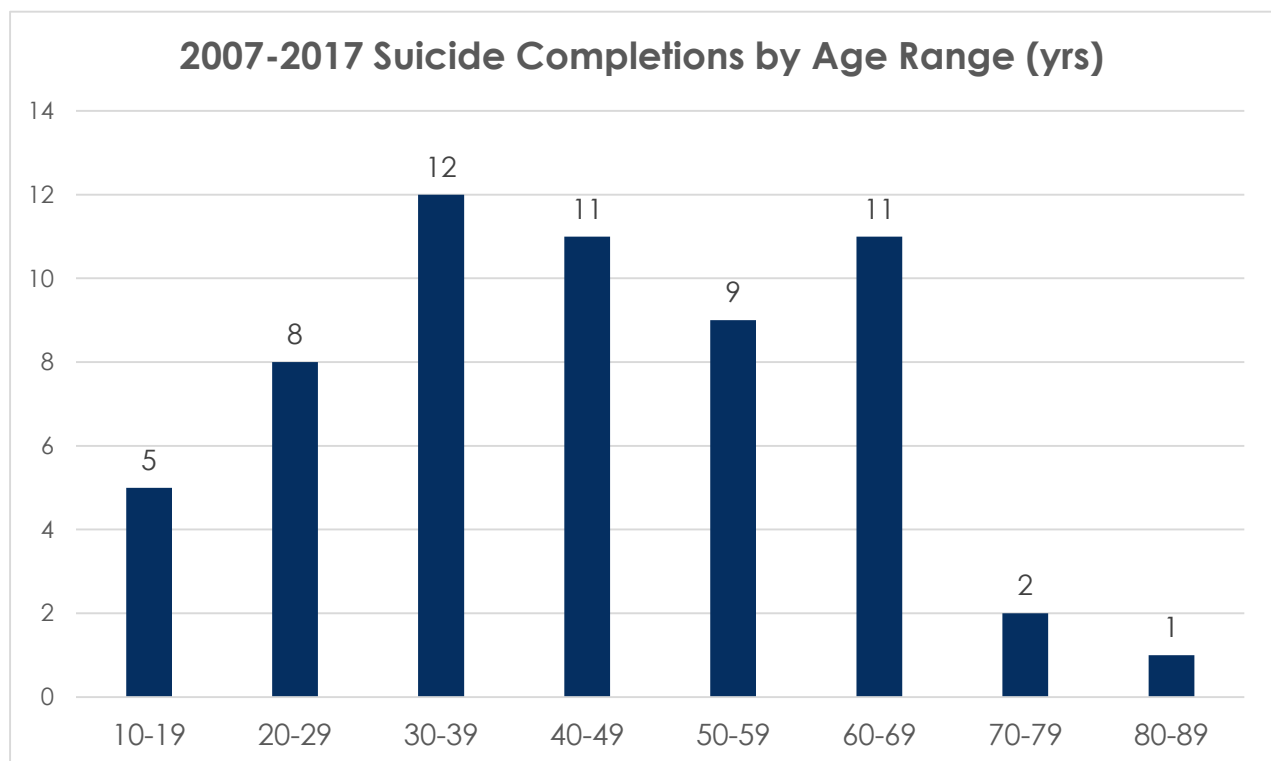

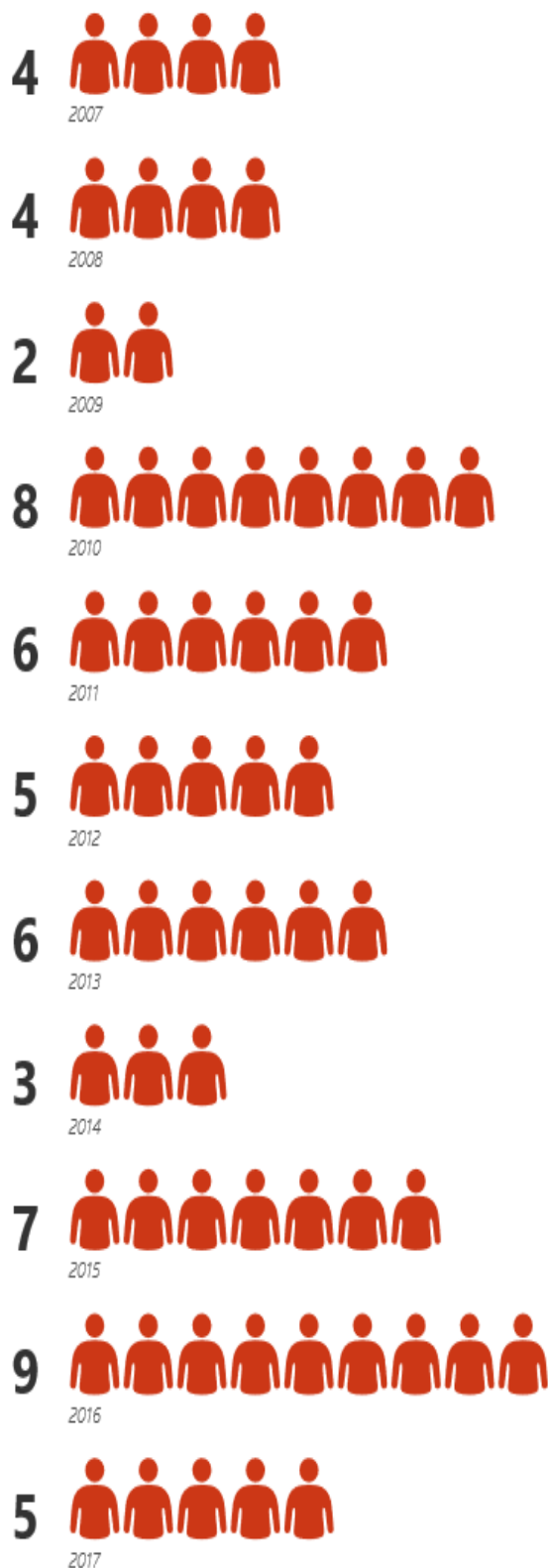
SEPTEMBER – SUICIDE PREVENTION MONTH

September is annually recognized as Suicide Prevention Month. Crawford County Public Health partnered with the Marion-Crawford ADAMH Board to compile a report to track the trends for the suicide completions in Crawford County for years 2007 through 2017. The purpose of the report is to bring awareness to the issue and to assist in understanding risk factors involved. Suicide is preventable. However, we must acknowledge that stigma, whether or social or perceived, is too often a barrier that keeps individuals from seeking out the help they need. Crawford County Public Health, along with our community partners, is working to help reduce stigma and prevent suicide in Crawford County.

During the ten years reviewed, fifty-nine (59) Crawford County residents completed suicide. The youngest was 16 years old and the oldest was 81 years old, with an average age of 44.5 years.



TOTAL SUICIDE COMPLETIONS BY YEAR



In 2016, suicide was the 7th leading cause of death in Crawford County. Between 2007 through 2017, the Crawford County suicide completion rate was higher than both the Ohio and National rates.

What Are the Warning Signs of Suicide?

The behaviors listed below may be signs that someone is thinking about suicide.

- Talking about wanting to die or wanting to kill themselves
- Talking about feeling empty, hopeless, or having no reason to live
- Planning or looking for a way to kill themselves, such as searching online, stockpiling pills, or newly acquiring potentially lethal items (e.g., firearms, ropes)
- Talking about great guilt or shame
- Talking about feeling trapped or feeling that there are no solutions
- Feeling unbearable pain, both physical or emotional
- Talking about being a burden to others
- Using alcohol or drugs more often
- Acting anxious or agitated
- Withdrawing from family and friends
- Changing eating and/or sleeping habits
- Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge
- Taking risks that could lead to death, such as reckless driving
- Talking or thinking about death often
- Displaying extreme mood swings, suddenly changing from very sad to very calm or happy
- Giving away important possessions
- Saying goodbye to friends and family
- Putting affairs in order, making a will

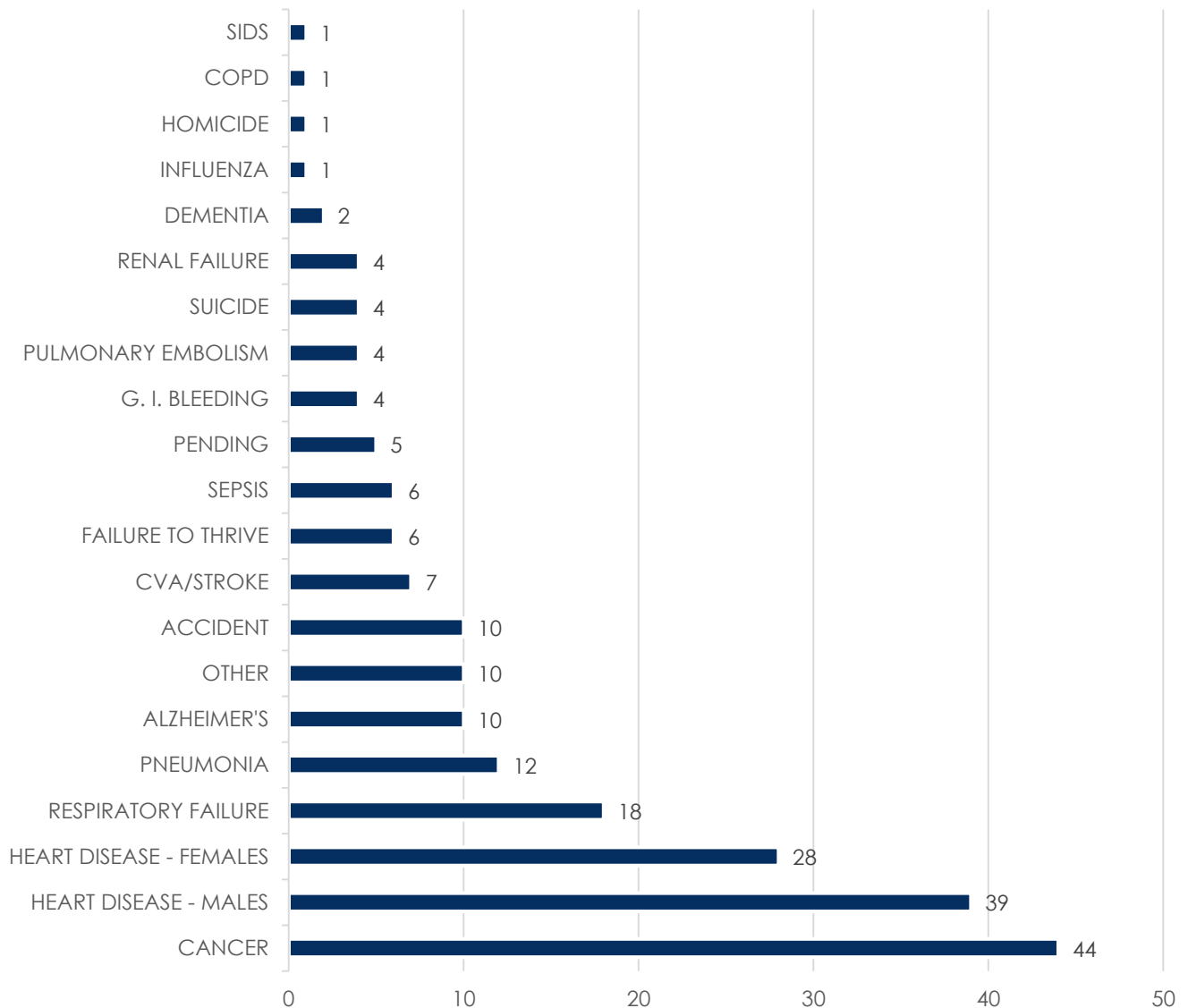

NURSING DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

Immunization Program

Immunization appointment clinics are held every 1st, 4th, and any 5th Thursday 9-11:30am and 1-4pm; every 2nd and 3rd Thursday 9-11:30am and 3-6:30pm at the Health Department.

We also have a clinic the 3rd Wednesday of each month from 9-11:30am at St. John's Lutheran Church in New Washington. (Photo at right was taken at New Washington.)

During August we held 6 extra clinics to accommodate more students needing school required vaccines for a total of 12 clinics in August.

A total of 629 clients were seen and 1214 vaccines were given in the 3rd quarter.

In July we started the Get Vaccinated Ohio Grant to help raise and maintain immunization levels among children and adolescents.



Communicable Disease Investigation

The Nursing Department investigated the following number of communicable disease cases during the 3rd quarter of the year: 43 Hepatitis C, 4 Hepatitis B, 40 Chlamydia, and 30 miscellaneous diseases.

Nurses provide services at Maryhaven (drug and alcohol treatment center) every 6 weeks for communicable disease education and testing.

During this quarter we tested 22 clients for STD's (8 of which we treated for positive results), 4 for Hepatitis C (2 of which were positive), and 6 for HIV (0 results).

CMH (Children with Medical Handicaps)

The Children with Medical Handicaps Program (CMH) is a health care program that links families to a network of quality providers and helps families obtain payment for the services their children need.

We currently have 107 children we assist with this program.

Jail Nursing

Nurses worked 431.25 hours at the Crawford County Justice Center from July - September with 330 inmates booked in, 245 physicals completed, 430 sick inmates seen, and 45 inmates seen for drug and alcohol withdrawals.

School Nursing

We are pleased to be able to continue providing services for six schools in Crawford County for the 2018-2019 school year: Buckeye Central, Bucyrus, Colonel Crawford, Crestline, Crestline St. Joe's, and Wynford. Additionally, we also fill in at Fairway/Waycraft when needed.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH DIVISION REPORT:

The 2017 grant cycle for the OEPA sewage grant continues with 15 properties in process. We submitted 3 pay requests to OEPA for completed projects which used \$46,740.00 of our allotted \$300,000 leaving us \$253,260 to spend on remaining and any additional projects. Our hope is use all of the \$300,000. If you aware of any residents in the townships that are in need of replacing their sewage systems and that might benefit from our grant, please have them contact our grant administrator, Cindy Brookes at 419-332-2078. We were awarded \$200,000 for our 2018 grant cycle and have applied for the maximum amount of \$150,000 for the 2019 cycle.

The food program was very busy during this quarter with inspections of all of the food facilities at the Crawford County Fair in July, the Bratwurst Festival in August and the Crestline Harvest Festival in September. Overall, inspections at all events went very smoothly and our staff encountered very few issues.

Our division received and reviewed plans for one new food operation (Lightning Nutrition) in Bucyrus. This facility is still in the construction stage so a final inspection and licensure of the facility have not yet taken place. We are anxiously awaiting the opening of this facility.

During the month of September our division worked closely with Healthspace (our food program licensing and inspection tracking system company) and our website coordinator to get our food inspections posted to our website for public view. Health Department Inspections

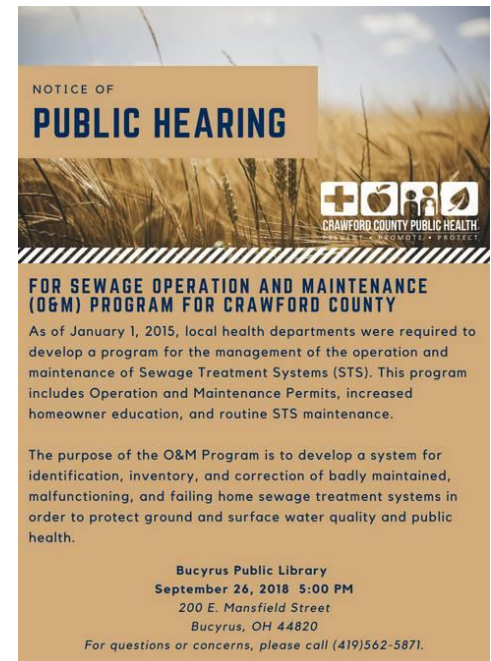
The Environmental Health Division promotes public health by addressing environmental factors that can affect human health. The primary role of the environmental staff is to prevent human illness or injury through public education, regulation, and advocacy. Staff sanitarians perform a wide variety of public health functions which include inspection, regulation, and enforcement of food facilities, public swimming pools/spas, campground/RV parks, manufactured home parks, private water supplies, private household sewage treatment systems, the county landfill, and tattoo/body piercing facilities. We have conducted our required annual cost analysis of the food program fees and analysis of other environmental program fees as needed. Per the analysis, food license fees will be increasing slightly, as well as the public swimming pool license fees. Our office held a public fee hearing on October 17th for all interested parties to voice their opinions of these fees.

In late August, the Environmental Director and a member of our fiscal office attended Performance Management training in Columbus. Performance management is a required plan and program that must be implemented by all local health departments as part of the public health accreditation process. The training was informative and provided our department with better insight in the development of our performance management plan.

On September 26, 2018, our division held a public meeting at Bucyrus Library for public input on our proposed sewage operation and maintenance program rules. In 2015, the Ohio Department of Health updated the state sewage rules which are the rules all local health departments enforce. One of the requirements in the new rules was that every health district across the state must develop an operation and maintenance program to ensure all sewage systems are being inspected and maintained on a regular basis. All household sewage systems throughout the county (new and existing systems) must be placed under this program within the next 10 – 20 years. Unfortunately, only two county residents attended the public meeting, however both were satisfied with the rules we have established. The rules will now go before the board of health for final approval and adoption. We will keep everyone updated as this process progresses.

HELP ME GROW (HMG) DIVISION



SUPPORTING PREGNANT WOMEN, YOUNG CHILDREN AND FAMILIES IN CRAWFORD COUNTY.

This quarter's highlight is receiving our Healthy Families America (HFA) accreditation in our Home Visiting program. The process involved developing and implementing policies along with collecting and analyzing data on 12 critical elements and 22 performance measures. Our four Home Visitors are currently serving over 80 families who want to improve their child's health, nutrition and developmental outcomes.

July 1 begins our new program year. HMG's Home Visiting program works on a reimbursement basis. We received payment of \$203,965 for last fiscal year and are awaiting an incentive payment of over \$81,000 for meeting positive outcomes with families. This includes among others, families keeping well child visits, family members quitting smoking, 1st trimester of pregnancy enrollment, completion of maternal depression screenings and referring for treatment as needed.



To share a little about what our home visiting program is all about, our Home Visitors initial work with families involves getting to understand their family's life story, for example, did their parents work, how were they raised, was there a dad in the home, did they have enough food growing up, were they afraid, abused neglected, what was the highest grade completed in school. With an understanding of their past, we work to create positive futures for them and their families. Through Family Service plans we work on goals that are important to the family. For some it is getting a GED, a job, quit smoking, or a place on their own. For others it could be helping their child walk, talk, behave better or sleep through the night.

As much as our workers thrive to establish relationships, because that is when we see change, they feel paperwork is their middle name. We screen development, depression, social connectedness, medical care, ER visits, home safety and more. All of this information is entered in a new state data system called OCHIDS (Ohio Comprehensive Integrated Data System). The system will eventually be

connected to other systems making referrals numbers increase. Although we are at capacity with the amount of families we serve, across the state, Ohio Dept. of Health (ODH) feels the program is underutilized.

Our Home Visitors also spend a lot of time referring for various services: mental health treatment, job programs, educational programs, food assistance, housing, domestic violence to name a few.

Success stories are submitted quarterly to ODH. Our successes involve families getting out of abusive relationships, enrolling in college, quit smoking, obtaining employment to name some of the recent successes. We have never had a quarter when the staff couldn't think of one.

The staff also promoted HMG services at Children's Day at the county fair, educated parents on safe sleep practices at the WIC baby shower and held Family Connection meetings at Splash Park in Galion and Lowe Volk park this quarter.

Ohio received over 27,00 Early Intervention (EI) referrals in SFY 2018 (July 1 2017-June 30, 2018). Of those referrals, 22, 057 were served in Early Intervention with 96 being Crawford County children. Typically, we have 50 children enrolled in our county's EI program on any given day.



Two CCPH Service Coordinators meet with families who may have a concern about their child's development, have a medical diagnosis that places their child at risk of developmental delay or have a child in their home that was exposed prenatally to drugs or was a victim of abuse or neglect. Since July 1 we have completed 17 developmental evaluations to determine if the child meets the definition of developmental delay. Once made eligible, services for the children include special instruction, speech therapy, physical therapy or occupational therapy through partnership with Fairway School. We also utilize vision services through Ohio State School of the Blind and Family Life Learning Center/Akron Children's Hospital for family training for families with a child with hearing loss.

EI Service Coordinators explain eligibility and program rights, develop service plans, monitor the child's progress, make referrals to other programs, coordinate services such as respite care, adaptive equipment, specialty clinics, provide support and information as well as transition to preschool services as the child nears age three. This program serves all income levels although many meet Federal poverty guidelines.

HELP ME GROW (HMG) DIVISION

We are happy to announce that the Help Me Grow Division is partnering with Cribs for Kids®, a National Infant Safe-Sleep Initiative to promote infant safe sleep practices for parents in Crawford County. Safe sleep education, along with portable cribs (pack 'n plays), are provided FREE to families that meet eligibility requirements and could not otherwise afford them (while quantities last). This is the 4th Quarter for FY18

- At the end of this Quarter, we have spent approximately 97% of the Grant. This grant cycle ended September 30, 2018 with the FY19 grant beginning October 1, 2018.
- We have attended Crawford Community Council, Crawford Childhood Initiative, Family and Children First, Prenatal Outcomes, Dream Child Conference, Monthly Board meetings, Directors Meetings, SMILE group meetings (Supporting Mother Infant Lactation Education) at Avita Hospital, Northwest WIC Directors Meeting, Community Health Assessment meeting, and a breastfeeding conference in Columbus.
- What is going on at WIC; we continue to educate participants on Nutrition and Breastfeeding, along with being a referral program to the many different agencies in the community. We continue to work with the Health Department to make sure our participants are up to date on all of the immunizations that they need and lead screenings. We work with Help Me Grow by referring many of our new pregnant moms to their program for the guidance they may need as a new parent, or a parent of many, or referrals to agencies that may help them in their journey as a parent.
- We held our 16th annual baby shower for pregnant mom's in August to celebrate Breastfeeding awareness month. Avita helped sponsor the event. We held it at Galion hospital, there was food, provided by the Galion Hospital Food and Nutrition department, prizes by the vendors that were represented, tour of the OB department and Deanna Grube spoke on skin to skin and Help Me Grow gave a presentation on Safe Sleep. In all there were approximately 80 people in attendance. It was a great event to the start of Breastfeeding Awareness month. Many other activities took place to promote breastfeeding in our community.

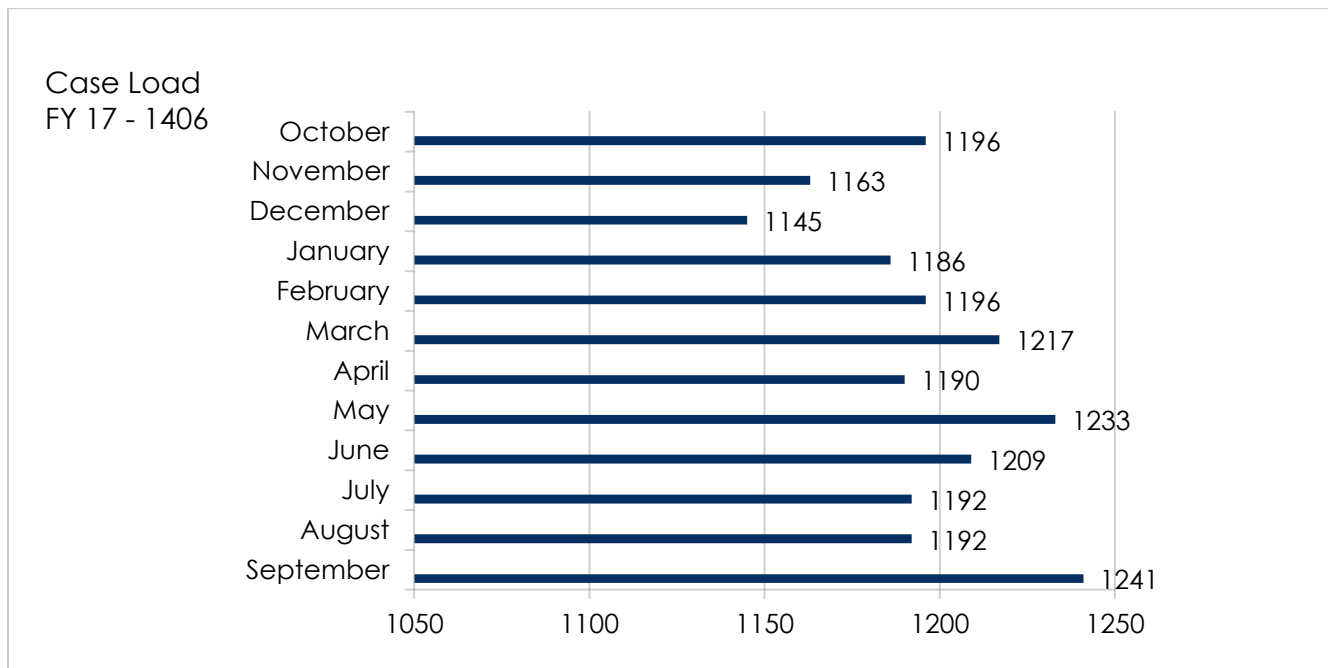

A PEEK AT THE PAST

In 1947, the Crawford County Board of Health passed an emergency resolution to quarantine ALL dogs in Cranberry Township (the township that includes and surrounds New Washington) in response to a dog testing positive for rabies.

Thankfully, dog rabies vaccination programs have halted the spread of rabies among domestic dogs and they are no longer considered a rabies carrier in the U.S. Unfortunately, unvaccinated pets can still become infected from wildlife (bats, raccoons, skunks) and each year 60 to 70 dogs in the U.S. are reported rabid.

This glimpse at our Crawford County Public Health history provides us with a reminder to vaccinate our pets.
