

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### **EPIDEMIOLOGY TRACKING & SURVEILLANCE**


The number of infectious disease cases increased from November to December (14 and 23 cases, respectively). **Table 1.** illustrates the types of illnesses reported in Crawford County during December and the number of cases for each of these conditions. Between the two months, cases of chlamydia (9 in November) and Hepatitis B (2 in November) decreased while cases of Hepatitis C (2 in November) increased. Cases of cryptosporidiosis, influenza-associated hospitalization, and varicella were also reported during the month of December.

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### **ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH DIVISION REPORT:**

In December 2107 we were notified we have been awarded the 2018 OEPA grant for repair and replacement of septic systems in the county. The amount of this award is \$200,000 (the maximum amount that could be applied for by a health jurisdiction). Cindy Brookes from WSOS has again graciously agreed to be our administrator for this grant.

The 2016 OEPA grant for repairing/replacing septic systems officially closed on November 30, 2017. This grant funded 9 systems repaired or replaced and we utilized approximately \$93,000 of the allotted \$132,000. The majority of the replacement systems occurred in Oceola, with the remaining systems spread across the remainder of the county.

The 2017 OEPA grant for repairing/replacing septic systems currently has 10 individuals deemed eligible for funding. These systems are in the bidding process for soil analyses, designs, and installation. Our department continues to seek more households that may benefit from the 2017 sewage grant.

Our division has also continued to conduct bed bug training in conjunction with a grant that was offered by Crawford County Job & Family Services. JFS received a grant to offer bed bug treatment

services to eligible Crawford County residents. As part of this grant, eligible residents must receive training on bed bug identification, home maintenance, and treatment before any treatment services can commence. Our division conducted 4 trainings during the last quarter of 2017. The grant continues into 2018 and we are hoping to assist more Crawford County residents in the New Year.

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#### PHAB ACCREDITATION PROGRESS UPDATES

### **OPHA Accreditation Mentoring Project**

 During the month of November, our agency was awarded grant funding from OPHA (Ohio Public Health Association) and APHA (American Public Health Association). This grant supports accreditation readiness for local health departments and provides funding for a mentoring relationship for mentee and mentor. Marion County Health Commissioner, Tom Quade was assigned our mentor. Prior to becoming the Marion County Health Commissioner, Tom was the Accreditation Coordinator at Summit County and facilitated their successful award of becoming PHAB accredited. We are excited to work with Tom and look forward to gaining invaluable knowledge from him.

### **Workforce Development**

Thanks to the assistance provided by Ohio State University, we were able to wrap up the
writing of our Agency's Workforce Development Plan the end of December. The completion
of our workforce development plan will continue to strengthen our ability to address gaps in
knowledge, skills, and, abilities of our agency's workforce.

### All Staff Accreditation Meetings

For the month of December, our first In-service All Staff Training Day took the place of the monthly Accreditation Staff Meeting. This training day allowed staff to gain insight, or serve as a refresher, on important topics in public health such as Blood Borne Pathogens, HIPAA, Ohio Ethics Law, and Culture Competencies. The Environmental Health Division also



volunteered to cover topics related to Food Safety 101, Bed Bugs, and Public Health Emergency Preparedness.

### Strategic Plan

Writing for our agency's Strategic Plan was also completed during the month of December. Again, this would not have been possible without guidance from the Ohio State University College of Public Health extension. Our agency's Strategic Plan includes our defined mission statement, vision statement, and the primary goals and objectives of our agency. This plan will soon be adopted by the Board of Health and made available on our agency's website.


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### HELP ME GROW (HMG) DIVISION





The fourth quarter is always a busy but joyful time for Help Me Grow. By October, plans were underway for our annual Holiday Open House which is held the first Monday in December. Over 100 people attended the event and we are very appreciative of the CCPH staff and community volunteers who helped. Money for food was purchased through our local Board of Developmental Disabilities, make and take picture frames were donated by Family & Children First Council (FCFC), books were donated by Crawford Reads 20 (a new book distribution program stressing the importance of reading for 20 minutes each day to your young child), and gift bags were provided by the YWCA Child Care & Referral Network. The following agencies had staff helping: CCPH WIC and nursing divisions, FCFC, YWCA Childcare & Referral Network, Crawford Reads 20 and Fairway School. Last, but certainly not least, is our dedicated Santa, Robert Gardner, who donates his time each year!



At the beginning of this quarter, we experienced a huge change in Help Me Grow. Across Ohio, we went from local Help Me Grow staff conducting program outreach and contacting families who may be interested in our program to a single central call in site based in Cleveland. The new system has gone through many growing pains. In Crawford County, we stopped receiving any new referrals in our Home Visiting Program. Consequently, we learned in order to survive as a





program we had to continue our own central coordination efforts. Our staff continues to visit doctor's offices, meeting with potential interested parents at WIC, and contacting any potential new

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families. These activities are no longer funded through the Ohio Department of Health, so donations such as GE can assist us in reaching and serving eligible families.

Help Me Grow met a huge milestone this quarter. We set as a target to serve 80 families in our Home Visiting Parent Support Program. We recently met that goal. No other county our size is serving that many young families. We commend our hard working staff for that accomplishment.

Other events this quarter include two family events at Fairway School. We also continue to participate in community programs and advisory boards such as GRADS (parenting support program at Pioneer School), Family & Children First Council, Crawford Reads 20, Ohio Heartland Headstart, and our CHIP and Accreditation process.

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### **NURSING DIVISION - 4TH QUARTER HIGHLIGHTS**

### **Immunization Program**

- A total of 801 clients were seen and 1,180 vaccines were given between October-December 2017.
- Between our regular clinics, Boo to the Flu Drive Thru Flu Clinic, Crawford County Health Fair, Crestline Village Employees, Fairway/Waycraft staff and individuals, and Homebound Flu, we administered 630 flu vaccines.

### Communicable Disease Investigation

- The law requires specific diseases to be reported to local health departments in an effort to control the incidence and spread of communicable disease.
- The Nursing Department investigated 102 communicable diseases the 4th quarter of the year. 52 Hepatitis C, 6 Hepatitis B, 27 Chlamydia and 14 miscellaneous diseases.
- Nurses go to Maryhaven (drug and alcohol treatment center) every 6 weeks for communicable disease education and testing. This quarter we tested 13 clients for STD's, 6 clients for Hepatitis C, and 13 clients for HIV.

### CMH (Children with Medical Handicaps)

The Children with Medical Handicaps Program (CMH) is a health care program in the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). CMH links families of children with special health care needs to a network of quality providers and helps families obtain payment for the services their children need. CMH receives funding for services from the federal Maternal and Child Health Block Grant, state general revenue funds, county tax funds, third-party reimbursements and donations.

• We currently have 122 children we assist with this program with 11 home visits conducted between October – December 2017.

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### **Jail Nursing**

- Nurses worked 392.75 hours at the Crawford County Justice Center.
- October December Statistics:
  - o 286 inmates booked in
  - 177 physicals completed
  - o 296 sick inmates seen
  - o 22 inmates seen for drug and alcohol withdrawals.

### **School Nursing**

- Our public health nurses provide services for six schools in our county: Buckeye Central, Bucyrus, Colonel Crawford, Crestline, Crestline St. Joe's, and Wynford. We also fill in, as needed, for the nurse at Fairway/Waycraft.
- The nurses at the schools have been seeing students for: accidents, illnesses, head lice checks, blood sugar checks and insulin administration, administration of medications, vision and hearing screenings, phone calls to parents and doctors, reviewing records, blood pressures, mandated reporting in abuse cases, etc. for a total of over 10,000 contacts with students between October December 2017.

### Sexual Health Clinic

 As of April 2016 we became part of a grant with Union County Health Department to provide services for a Reproductive Health and Wellness Clinic twice a month. This clinic provides affordable reproductive healthcare for men and women ages 13 and up.

### This is my 1st Quarter for FY18


- For FY18 our Grant has been awarded is \$292,902. The Grant will run from 10/01/2017-09/30/2018. At the end of the 1st Quarter we have spent approximately 21% of the Grant. Our anticipated case load is 1,284.
- We have attended Crawford Community Council, Crawford Childhood Initiative, Family and Children First, Prenatal Outcomes, Dream Child Conference, Monthly Board meetings, Directors Meetings, SMILE group meetings and the State WIC Directors meeting.
- What is going on at WIC; we continue to educate participants on Nutrition and Breastfeeding, along with being a referral program to the many different agencies in the community. We continue to work with the Health Department to make sure our participants are up to date on all of the immunizations that they need and lead screenings. We work with Help Me Grow by referring many of our new pregnant moms to their program for the guidance they may need as a new parent, or a parent of many, or referrals to agencies that may help them in their journey as a parent.
- We hired a new clerk, Jill Stoffer, who started November 28, 2017 and will work 24 hours per week.
- **Vendor Redemption Report** We have 5 stores in Crawford County that are Vendors with the State WIC program (Krogers, Wal-Mart, Drug Mart, Geyer's & Save-A-Lot). The following lists the number of transactions at these stores along with the revenues these stores received from WIC participants shopping at their stores.
