Created August 1919, Crawford County Public Health's mission is to educate, empower, and improve the quality of life for the Crawford County Community. We do this by providing public health services that promote health and prevent disease.

Our 7-member governing body is the Crawford County Board of Health. Elected officials within Crawford County (township trustees and village mayors) appoint four of our Board members. Two Board members are appointed by the City of Bucyrus. One Board member is appointed by the District Licensing Council. At least one Board member must be a physician. The Board of Health appoints the Health Commissioner.

Board of Health Roles & Responsibilities

A local board of health is the policy-making, rule-making, and adjudicatory body for public health within its jurisdiction. The primary responsibilities for the board include:

- Set policy for strategic direction
- Enact resolutions to carry out day-to-day business of the organization
- Approve rules & regulations for department operations
- Employ & evaluate the health commissioner
- Review operational data for pattern & trends
- Approve health department programs
- Approve key financial actions for the department including the budget that is submitted to the county budget commission.

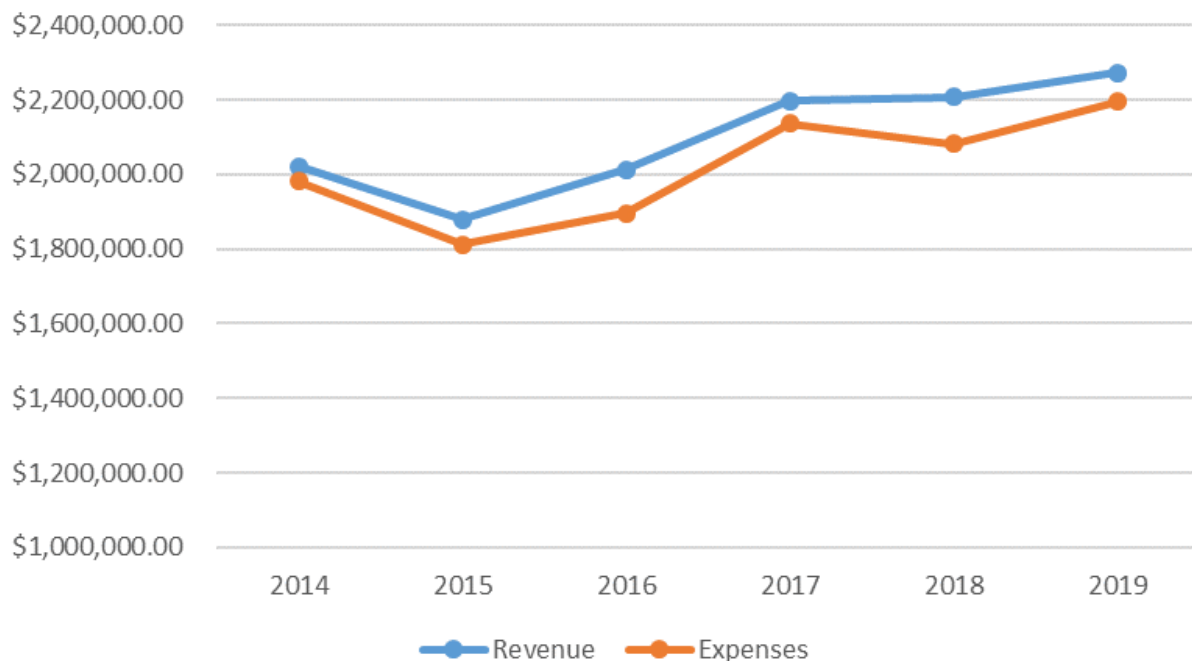

Overall Revenues & Expenses (2014-2019)

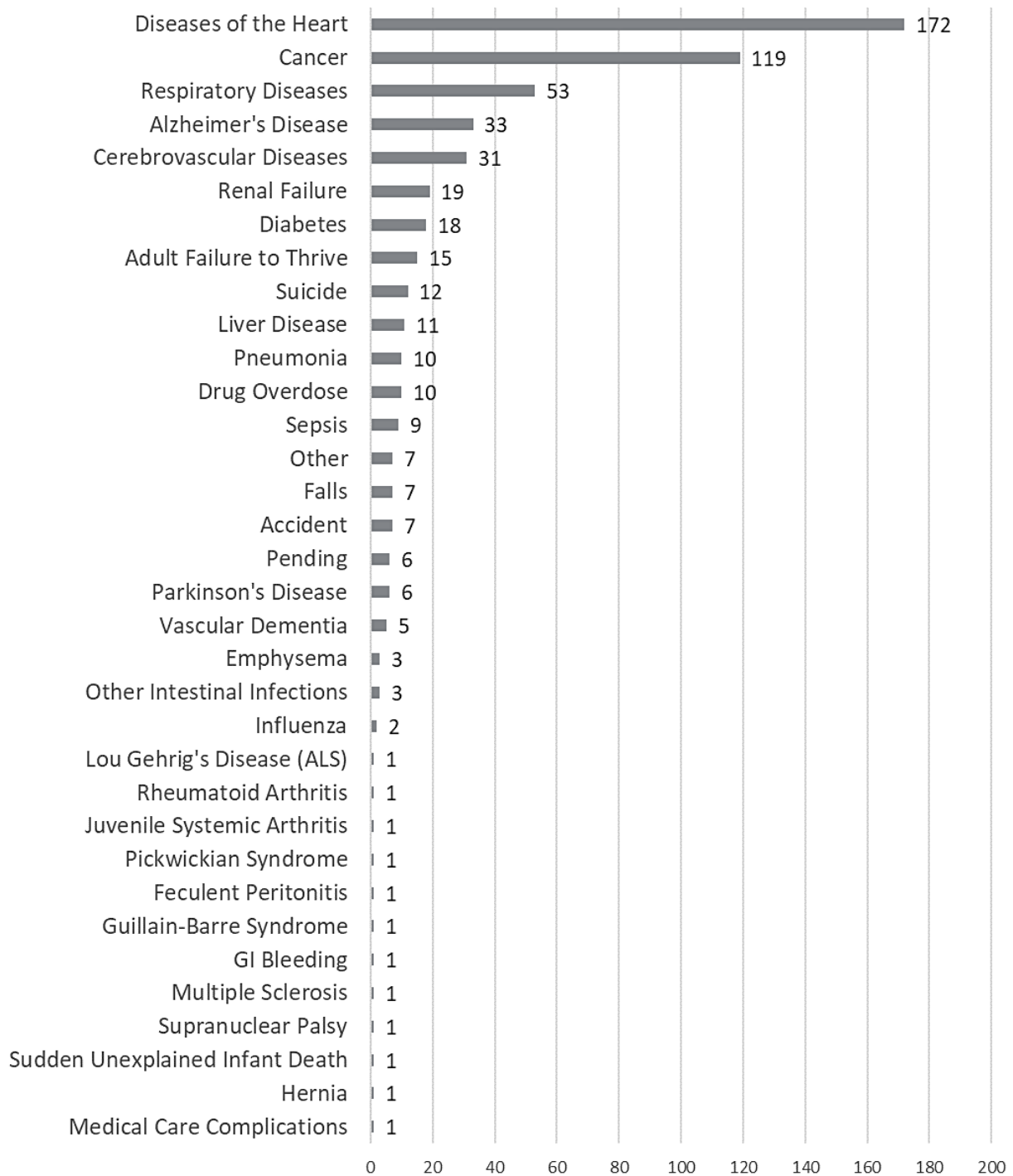


VITAL STATISTICS

There were 570 Crawford County resident deaths in 2019. The top 3 causes of death were Diseases of the Heart, Cancer, and Respiratory Diseases. The youngest death was one month old and the oldest death was 108 years old.

Our office issued a total of 189 Burial Permits, 1,106 Certified Copies of Death Certificates and 1,387 Certified Copies of Birth Certificates.

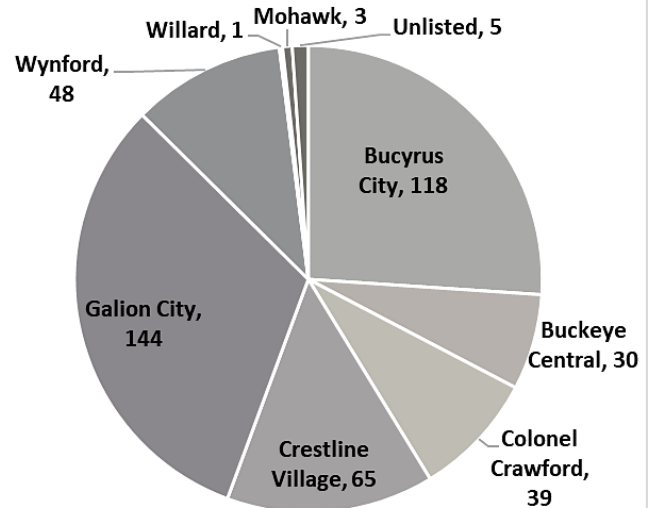

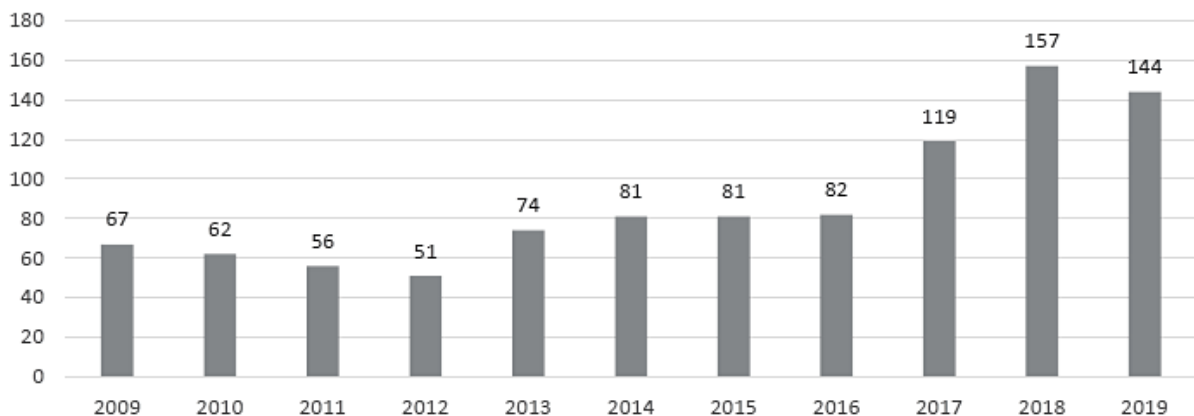

2009-2019 Crawford County Total Number Overdoses

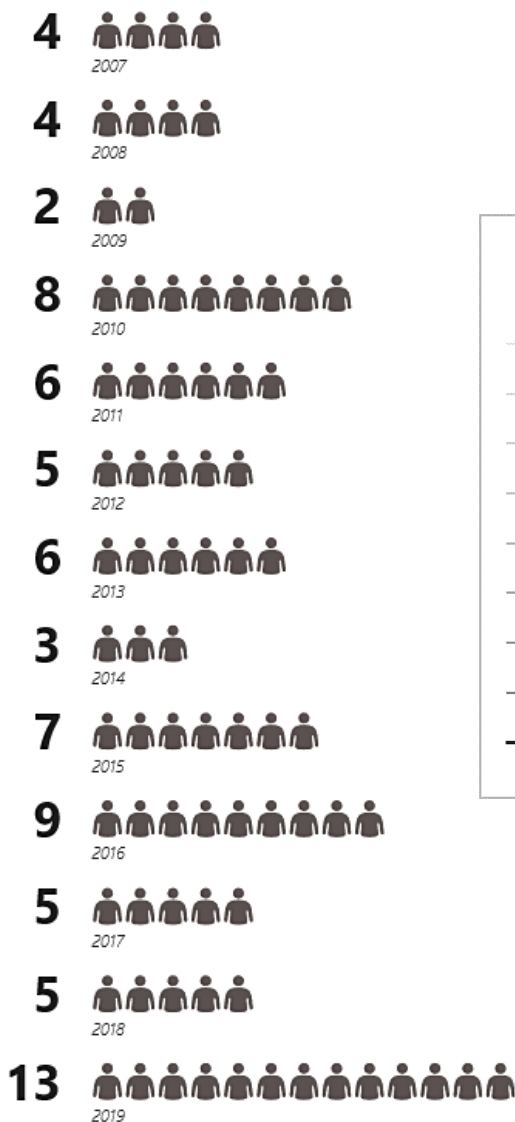


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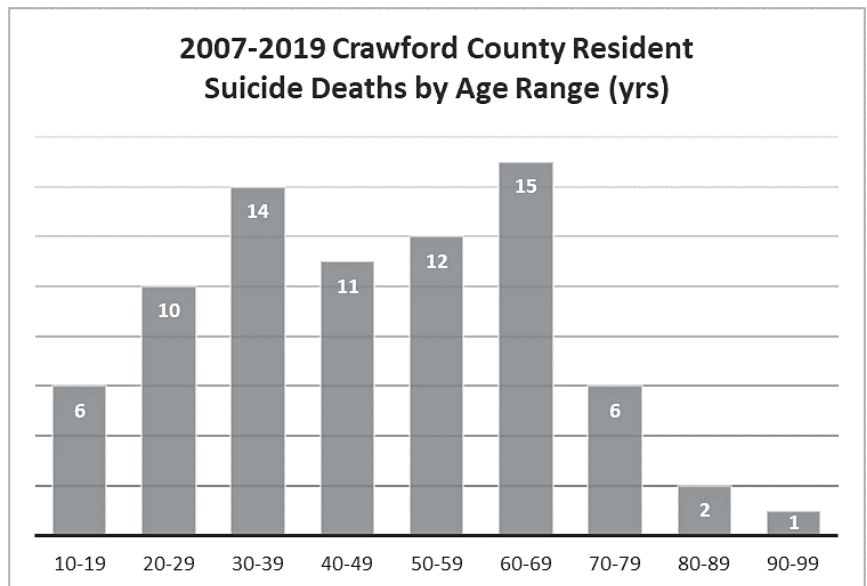
SUICIDE PREVENTION

Crawford County Public Health is a member of the Crawford County Suicide Prevention Coalition. Suicide and intentional self-harm are major public health problems. In 2018, suicide was the 11th leading cause of death in Ohio among all ages and the 2nd leading cause of death among Ohioans 15-34 years of age. Crawford County experienced more suicide completions in 2019 than any other year.

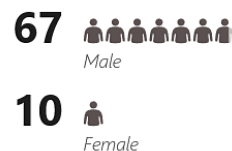
TOTAL SUICIDE COMPLETIONS BY YEAR

2007-2019 COMPLETED SUICIDES BY GENDER

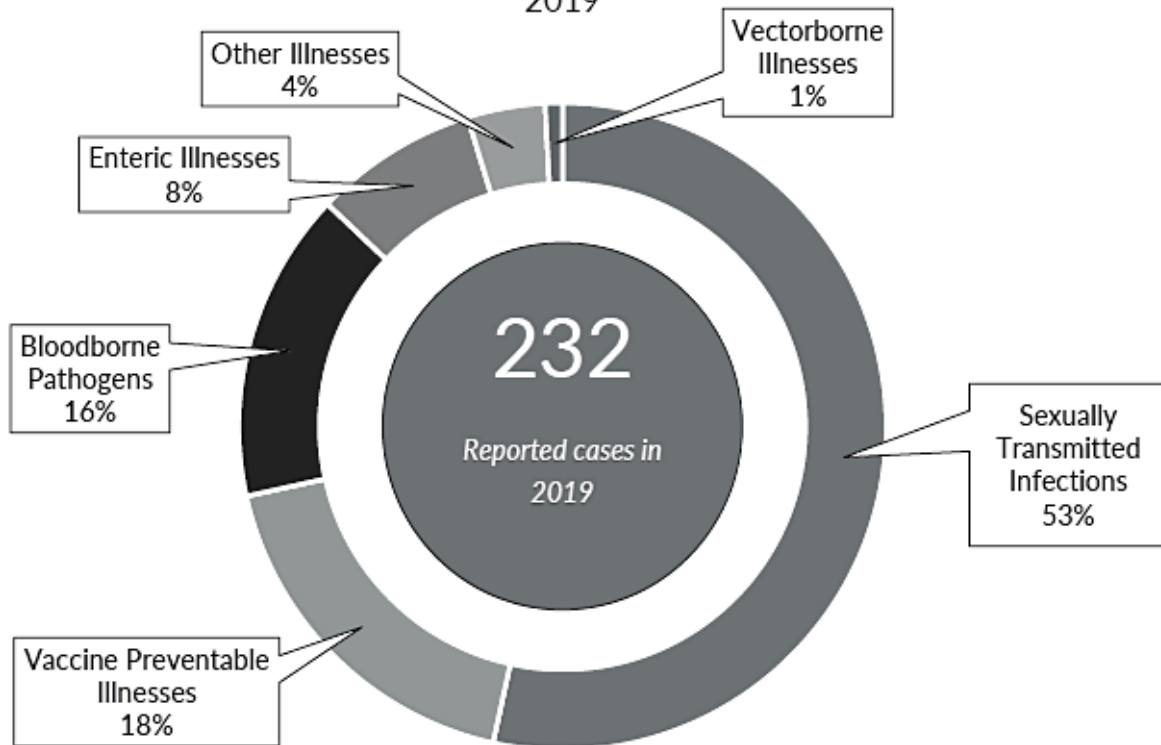


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COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

Crawford County saw a 9.4% decrease in communicable diseases from 2018 to 2019 (256 cases and 232 cases, respectively). The most frequently reported illnesses were chlamydia (102 cases), Hepatitis C (36 cases), influenza-associated hospitalizations (28 cases), gonorrhea (22 cases), and Hepatitis B (7 cases). All of these diseases were in the top five reported in 2018 as well.

Figure 2. Types of Communicable Diseases Reported in Crawford County, 2019



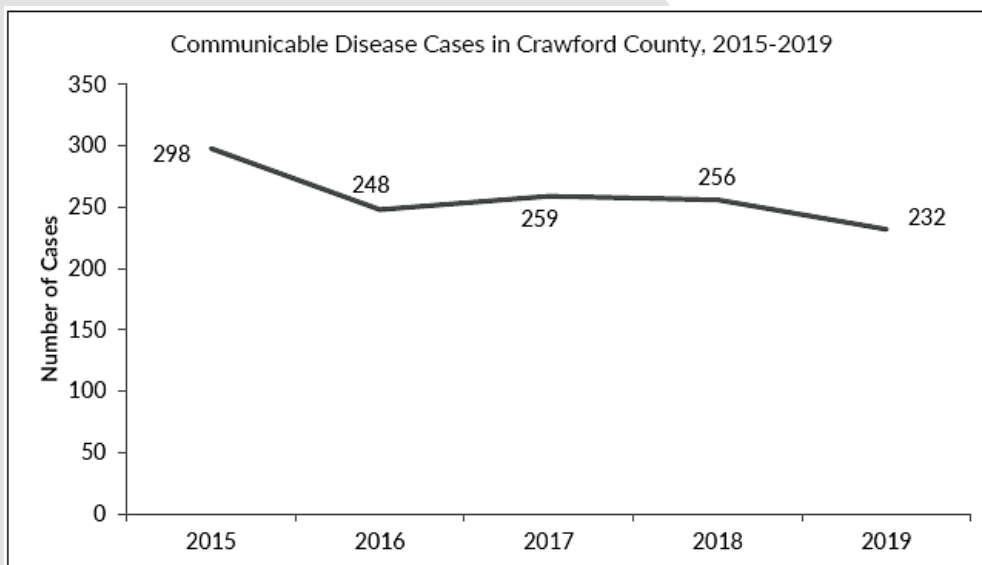

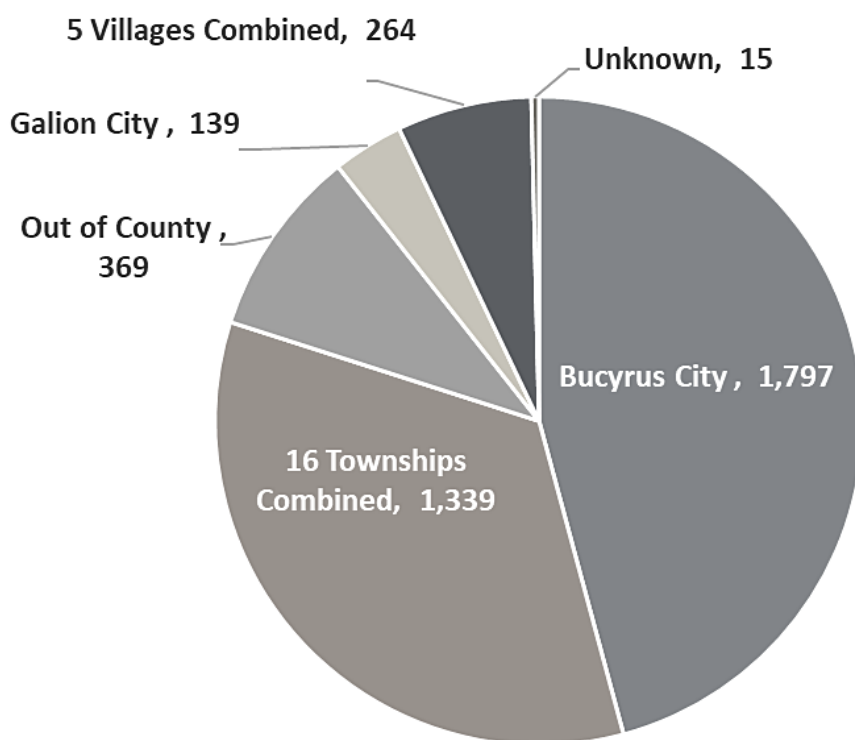

NURSING DIVISION

The public health nursing division focuses on population dynamics with the goal of promoting health and preventing disease. Our nursing programs include: immunization clinics for all ages, communicable disease investigation, Children with Medical Handicaps, STD/HIV testing, case management for elevated blood lead levels, blood pressure checks, head/lice checks, and providing services to six (6) local schools, the county jail, and Council on Aging.

2019 Vaccines Provided Based on Client's Place of Residence



Immunizations (vaccines) are provided by public health nurses to persons 6 weeks of age and up, following the current Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines. Crawford County Public Health is a Vaccine for Children (VFC) provider, which means we can provide free vaccines for un- and under-insured children through age 18 in Crawford County.

NURSING DIVISION (CONT.)

Drive-thru flu shot clinics allow persons to be quickly vaccinated in a convenient location without having to get out of their vehicle. These clinics are perfect for anyone with mobility issues or little ones in car seats! Setting up a drive-thru clinic also allows our staff to practice our emergency preparedness plans annually to improve our plans for providing mass vaccination or medication distribution during an emergency event.



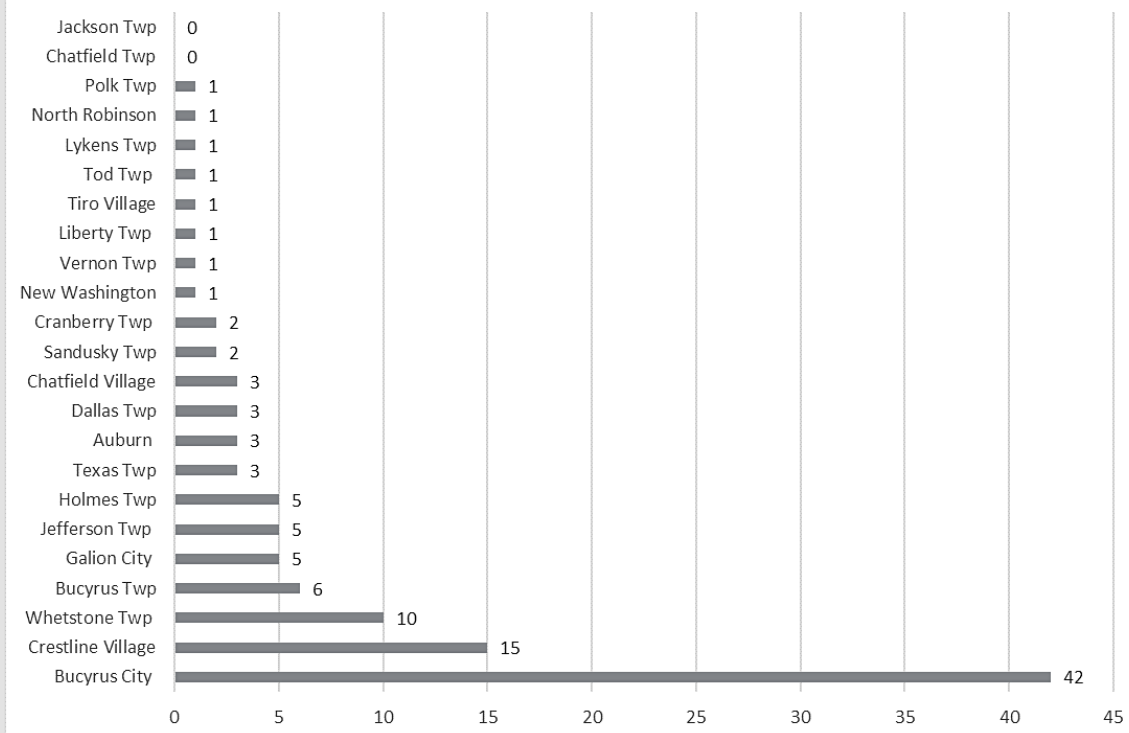

Number of participants during our 3-hour drive thru flu clinic October 1, 2019



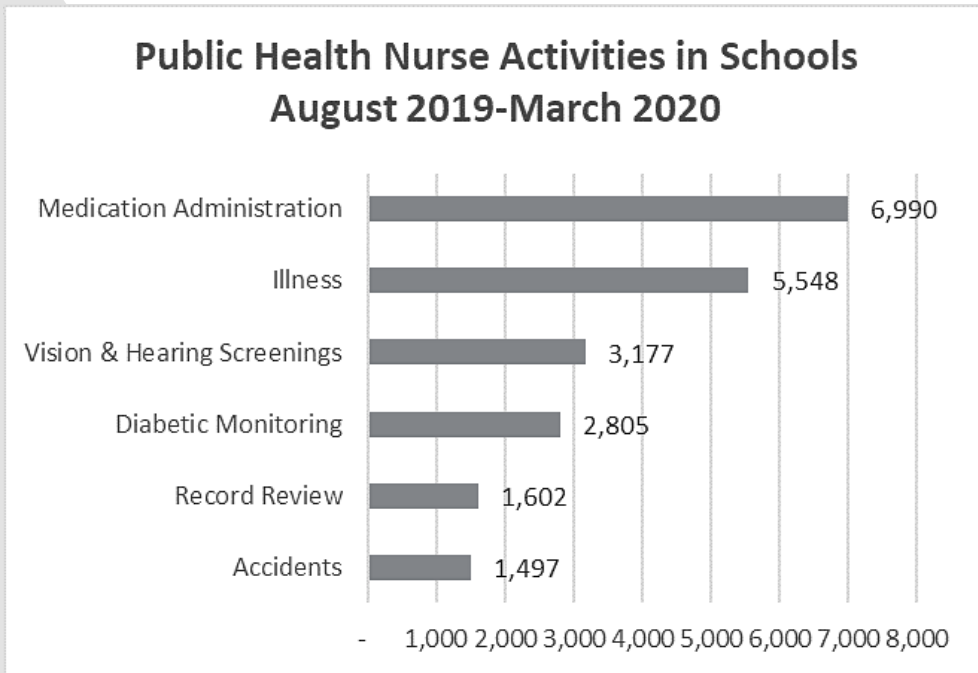
Children with Medical Handicaps (CMH) is a financial assistance program for families with children with special health care needs. Our nurses help families with their CMH applications and provide case management for those approved. In 2019 we served 112 CMH clients.

NURSING DIVISION (CONT.)

Crawford County Public Health employs five part-time nurses to provide nursing services to Buckeye Central, Bucyrus, Colonel Crawford, Crestline, Crestline St. Joe's, and Wynford local schools. The nurses provide vision screenings, hearing screenings, medication administration, diabetic monitoring, and respond to accidents and illness that occur during the school day.



Lead management services are provided by our public health nurses. Every zip code in Crawford County is considered high risk for elevated blood lead levels. Lead poisoning is a serious environmental health risk to children in Ohio. Crawford County Public Health contracts with the Crawford County Jail to provide daily nursing services for the inmates.

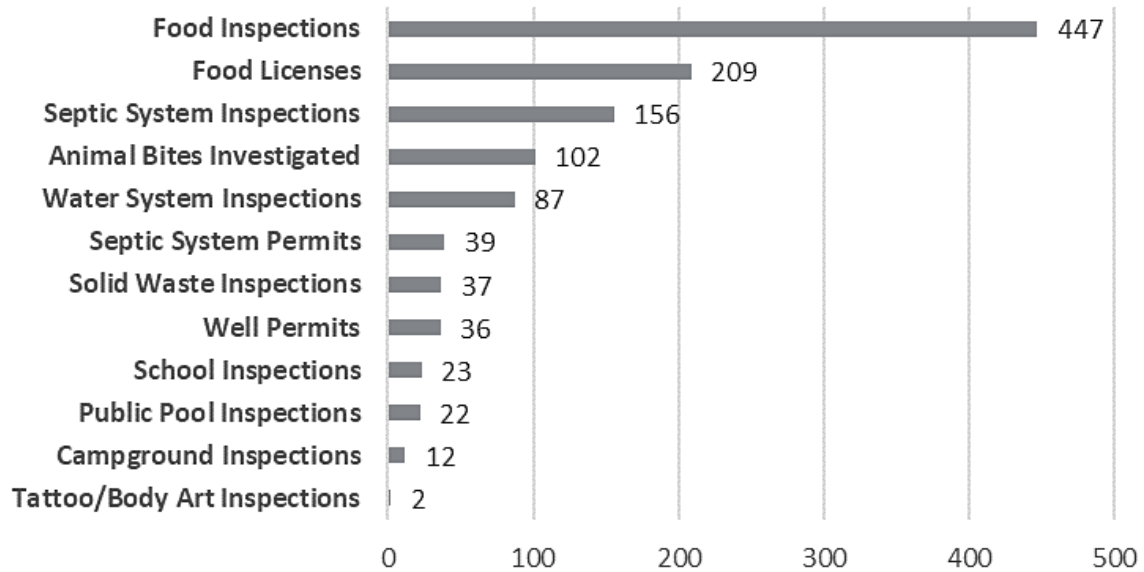

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH DIVISION

The Environmental Health (EH) Division is comprised of the staff sanitarians (health inspectors) that focus on environmental factors that can affect our health. The EH Divisions primary role of preventing human illness or injury is mainly done through the inspection, regulation, and enforcement of food facilities, septic systems, private water systems, public swimming pools, campgrounds, mobile home parks, solid waste nuisances, and animal bites.

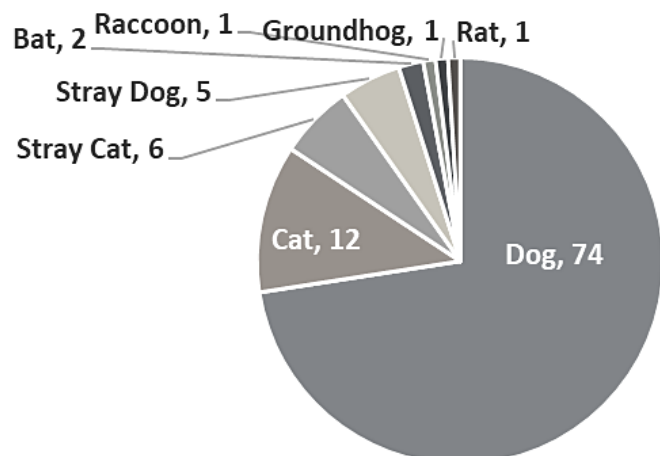
2019 Environmental Health Activities

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH DIVISION

The Food Safety Program provides the largest number of licensed facilities and inspections for the Environmental Health Division. Critical violations are those that could pose a significant threat to food safety and public health. Examples include: incorrect temperatures, improper food storage, hand wash sink inaccessible, operating without running water, and more. Non-critical violations have more minimal effects on food safety and limited threat to public health. Examples of non-critical violations include: general cleaning is not adequate, floors are damaged, improper lighting, lights missing shields, and more.

Top 5 Food Violations

- Inadequate facilities cleaning (floors, walls, ceilings, etc.)
- Inadequate maintenance of equipment/surfaces
- Inadequate cleaning of non-food contact surfaces
- Improper sanitizing solutions - testing devices
- Inadequate cleaning frequency of non-food contact surfaces

In August we celebrated the Grand Opening of our OhioHealth Mothers' Milk Bank Drop Off Site. Donated, pasteurized breast milk is distributed to NICU's across the nation and Canada. Just one ounce of donated breast milk can feed up to three premature babies for a day. In the first 3 months of being a drop off site, we shipped over 5,000 ounces of donated breast milk.

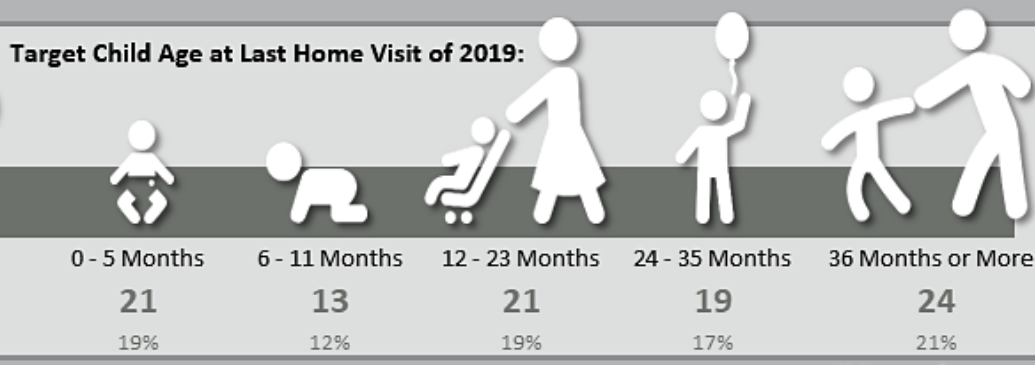
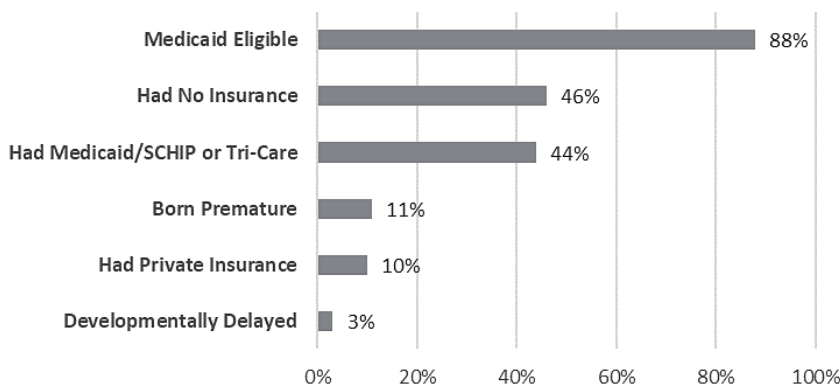


